Deborah Delucco presents **The Life and History of the DuBois House**

The DuBois Pioneer House and property have a long and interesting history spanning hundreds if not thousands of years of occupation. Built in 1898, it sits on the south side of Jupiter Inlet. The site of a Jeaga village, Jonathan Dickinson first described the property in 1669 with the publication of his journal. The DuBois House is an excellent example of how self-sufficient South Florida Pioneer families lived and prospered.

John Therrien presents **Ft. Pierce Inlet State Park: It's Not Just Another Pretty Beach**

Located on the north side of the Ft. Pierce Inlet, this property was the birthplace and training grounds of the U.S. Navy Frogmen, today's Navy Seals. Its shores were used by as many as 140,000 personnel who were stationed in the area to train for the D-Day invasion of Europe.



Spanning the Atlantic Ocean and Indian River Lagoon, Ft. Pierce Inlet State Park includes eight unique biological eco systems and offers public access for sunbathers, divers, snorkelers, surfers, canoers, kayakers, boaters, and fishermen.

Eric Ault presents **Florida Fish and Wildlife Fisheries Research**

Eric Ault is the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Research Administrator from Tequesta. He will discuss how FWC monitors marine and freshwater resources, wildlife and habitats, develops and implements techniques for restoring plant and animal species and their habitats, provides technical support for oil spills and when human-related or natural disasters occur, monitors red tides and provides technical support for state and local government and public health concerns, and provides fish and wildlife research and technical results to the state and local governments.

Irene Arpayoglou presents **The Indian River Lagoon Aquatic Preservation & Spoil Islands**
